Brendon and Paula Cross have had their hard work recognised by recently being named the Supreme winners of the prestigious '2016 Balance Farm Environment Awards' for the Otago region. As part of this they held what was a very successful Field Day at the Coronation Hall which included hosting over 100 people on a tour of various parts of their farm which covers lease blocks on Harbour Cone/High Road, and Sandymount as well as their home farm of Roselle. They were also winners of the Beef & Lamb NZ Livestock Award; The Farm Stewardship Award in partnership with the QEII National Trust and the NZ Farm Environment Trust; and the Otago Regional Council Quality Water Management Award.

Roselle Farm has been in Brendon's family for six generations. *Joseph Cross* was born in 1876 in a mud hut at Papanui Inlet. He married *Jessie McCartney* a grand daughter of James Seaton. Joseph managed the creamery at Wickliffe Bay then the creamery at Otakou. Their son Joseph Leslie Cross was Brendons grandfather. In 1863 James McCartney farmed the block at the top of Weir Road. His grandson William McCartney married *Annie Geary* and they had a daughter Alison. Alison was Brendons grandmother. Les and Alison took over the Cross family farm in 1952 and in 1957 converted from dairy to sheep farming. During their ownership they also replaced the old farm villa with a modern family home. So the Cross family forbears include both branches of the McCartney families the Seaton family and the Geary family all very well known names from the early days in the Portobello area.

As neighbouring farms became available over the years they were added to make up to 200ha by 1979. The various blocks on the farm have names that hark back many years—Seatons, Blimeys, Grannys, McCartneys, Jocks, Church Hill etc each with their own history.

A lot of development was done through the 1970's and 1980's by Brendon's parents Ron and Annette with a significant number of trees planted for land stabilisation and the building of an airstrip.

Brendon and Paula took over the running of the farm in 1998. Their vision is for farm sustainability where both the land and the animals are well cared for. They aim to make farming a profitable business so they can afford to put resources back into projects involving land protection such as fencing off and re-planting around streams and protecting native flora and fauna. These awards are a testament to their success. Brendon and Paula travel to the North Island in June to attend the National Finals dinner and awards. We wish them the very best in this final round.

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Portobello Marine Lab – wharf closure and other news

The University of Otago Portobello Marine Laboratory is about to start a large building project at the end of May. First, we will be demolishing the old (1960s) public aquarium building that is an earthquake risk. This is the smallest of the main buildings on the site and has been closed for more than three years.

The newer laboratory building (3 storey building on the water's edge) will continue to be open, housing New Zealand's premier marine research facility, and the New Zealand Marine Studies Centre will continue to deliver primary and secondary school education programmes in their modern building at the road end.

On the site of the old aquarium building we will erect a new 42-seat teaching lab. The lab will have running seawater and be fully up-to-date with the latest teaching lab standards. Scheduled completion date is late January 2017.

At the same time, the large holding ponds underneath the main lab will be refurbished. The exact work will depend on what we find when the ponds are drained and examined. The seawater delivery system for the whole site will also be upgraded.

Demolition and construction works require that there will be no public access to the laboratory's wharf as of Thursday 2nd June 2016. From this date the pedestrian access gates will be locked after hours.

It is also important to be aware that the construction project and the running of the new teaching lab will lead to an increase in traffic along the road to the lab. Many of the vehicles (construction machinery, buses, trucks towing boats) are large and have limited manoeuvrability. Please take care when walking along the road and keep dogs under control. The section from the second cattle stop is a private road owned by the University of Otago, which we are very happy to share with safe users.

Once all the work is completed, we will be delighted to show off our new facility by holding a public open day – probably in late summer.

The construction work will bring a good number of people to Portobello for quite some time and we know they will be welcome in the village.

More than 'Just a Walk in the Park'

We wish to congratulate **Olivia Clearwater** for her amazing result of **1st place** in the womens race (and 28th place overall) in the recent Routeburn Classic which was held on 24th April. Lil's time for the race was a mere 3 hours 42 minutes 38 seconds. This event is an 'adventure run' over the world famous Routeburn Track in Mt Aspiring National Park. Beginning at The Divide on the road to Milford Sound and winding 32 kilometres over what can be very rough and challenging terrain taking runners through native forest, past beautiful mountain lakes and waterfalls, across an exposed mountain pass to then follow the Routeburn River down to the finish at the Routeburn Shelter at the Glenorchy end of the track. The race is limited to 350 competitors.

Lil said *"I was pretty surprised and stoked with the results. I just entered it for a new challenge and experience so to be the 1st woman to finish was a pretty awesome feeling! It was such an amazing race, the track was challenging but the scenery kept my mind off the pain, haha."*

Rural Skip Day VEGETATION & GENERAL WASTE COLLECTION Sunday, 19 June 2016

Following on from the 'strictly vegetation only' collection October 2015 at the Rural Skip Day, the same collection will be available again at the next Rural Skip Day planned for Sunday, 19 June 10am – 4pm.

A discounted 'vegetation only' disposal fee will be available, once again, to Portobello and its surrounding Peninsula residents.

Mixed loads will be charged at the usual general waste fee for landfill disposal.

The 'strictly vegetation only' collection comes with some garden waste exclusions as the vegetation is taken to the Green Island Landfill site where it goes through a lengthy process, which turns the material into compost for further use.

Please do not include lawn clippings and flax or cabbage leaves as they are not suitable for composting. Any evidence of these materials will result in a general waste fee being applied for landfill disposal.

We appreciate your co-operation in checking for any excluded materials in your 'vegetation only' load before you arrive at the Rural Skip Day site.

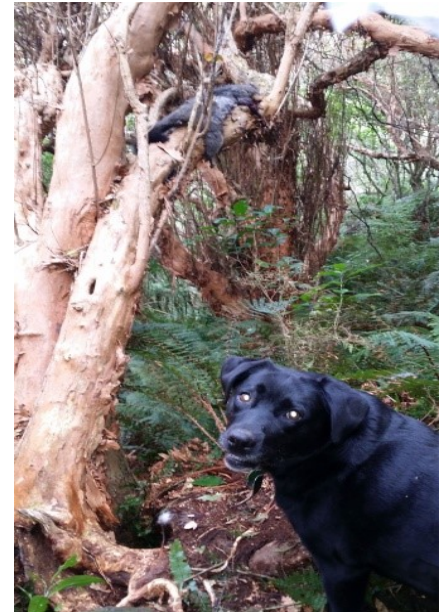
Running the spreadsheet on behalf of the OPBG for any possums seen, trapped or killed at home or on the road is very interesting. It is satisfying to know there are so many folk out there helping the group with this extremely challenging task. Some people text me, phone me or call in to the shop to notify me of any possums they have seen or killed. One local landowner takes the time to email me with his 'escapades' on the hill and Cathy and I thought his little tales were worth sharing. *Brenda Cameron*

Tales from the far side of the hill

Yesterday I went on a possum hunt on the South East side of the hill. To give the dogs a chance to pick up scents I walked slowly, weeding out numerous Darwins Barberry as I went. It was nice to be inspected by a juvenile male tomtit. After about 2 hours the dogs started barking in the large fuchsia gully with the under-storey of ferns. They had found a smallish male possum hiding in a hole in the roots of a fuchsia tree. The photo shows the despatched possum, a happy dog and the aforementioned hole.

I am not convinced that this is the same possum that I saw earlier in the week - that beast appeared to be much bigger, like the trout I see in rivers before I catch them.

After this success we headed downhill, through dense bush and steep gullies to intersect with the nearby track. We then walked along the track to the bit of wetland before heading up through the neighbouring property and back home. The dogs didn't show any further interest but, being middle-aged, overweight Labradors they were pretty tired by then, as was their middle-aged, very trim, owner.

An extra bonus was that the possum was feasting on a hitherto unknown patch of banana passion fruit and I took pleasure in destroying 3 big vines.

Year 7/8 Students – '7, 8, 9'

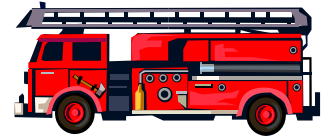

Winter Fire Safety

Electric Blankets

If your electric blankets or cord is showing signs of wear, have it checked by a competent service person or have it replaced. Don't take the risk.

Always make sure that your electric blanket is switched off before getting into bed.

Heaters and Clothes Dryers

After kitchen fires, fires involving heating and drying are the next most common reason the Fire Service is called out.

Don't store objects on top of your heating appliance.

Never cover heating appliances. Always keep furniture, curtains, clothes and children at least one metre away from heaters and fireplaces.

Don't overload clothes dryers and clean the lint filter after each load cycle.

The Fire Service was called to almost 62 house fires a week last year.

And residential fires resulted in 17 fatalities last year.

Smoke alarms. All of us will be aware of the importance of having working smoke alarms in your house.

It's good for democracy and will strengthen the Board into the future.

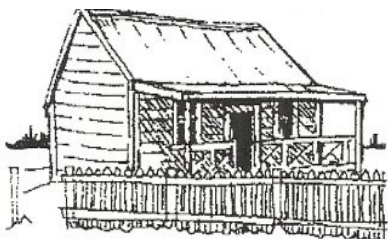

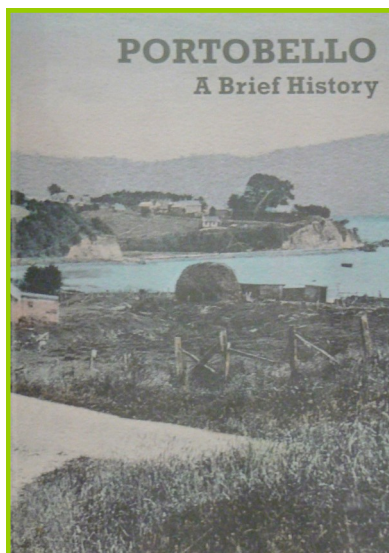
MUSEUM NEWS

Working on the Rogers Farm

On a blustery day punctuated by a few showers, students from the Otago University Anthropology Society worked at the Rogers farmstead on Hereweka today. With expertise provided by archaeologist Dr Peter Petchey, the team mapped the byre, barn, house and surrounding farm structures. The largely intact but heavily modified byre has a beautiful brick floor and stalls that would have been part of the Rogers' family dairy operation. One of the tasks of the Society was to produce a floor plan of this building that would give the Hereweka Trust a better understanding of its historical use.

The work of the Anthropology Society members is invaluable to the Trust. It provides further insight into the farming activities and the lives of the families that settled and worked in the Hereweka landscape.

The Trust are looking forward to having the students visit the area again and are excited about what more they can tell us about this site.

The Backyard Biodiversity project run by OPBG for schools & families has received a second boost of funding from MBIE Unlocking

science-based project will build on the 2015 pilot study to develop more appealing and user-friendly ways of recording observations of animals in school grounds and home gardens, in collaboration with Dragonfly Data Ltd and the Department of Conservation.

The project distributes monitoring kits to schools, whanau, and families in Dunedin that contain different devices to detect the presence of possums, rodents, hedgehogs, lizards and insects. The idea is that children experience collecting 'real' ecological data that is of importance to their learning, as well as to wider restoration efforts in the city.

Did you know

That possums may not make much noise if living by themselves? The loud calls that we're all familiar with are generally made between possum neighbours or pairs. If you own a property 2 acres or larger, we'll give you a chew card to check for what could be a silent possum presence. Just give us ring or email and we'll drop one off – it's very easy to install.

The theme for our ANZAC Day commemoration at the local Museum this year was
The NZ Tunnelling Company.

The following was read out by Russell Dickson

The Western Front – 1916



Lest We Forget.

After the Gallipoli campaign of 1915, the Allies (including New Zealand) were sent to fight the Germans on the Western Front which stretched through France and Belgium.

The New Zealand Tunnelling Company was the first NZ unit to arrive on the Western Front. The 446 officers and men were mostly experienced South Island coal and gold miners and they dug some 20km of tunnels, working alongside British tunnelling companies. 41 NZ tunnellers died and another 151 were injured during the construction and counter mining operations against the Germans. These tunnels connected with old underground caverns and housed 24,000 soldiers while they waited in safety for their first battles near the town of Arras.

The tunnels had electricity, running water, kitchen, hospital and a light rail system.

The Western Front was an indescribable quagmire of shell-raked trenches. British forces which included NZ and Australian forces were responsible for 135 km of the Western Front. Between May and August 1916 the NZ Division was involved in minor but costly operations and in this time 400 men died and 2,500 wounded,

During the Battle of the Somme in mid September NZ was involved in the 2nd big push designed to crack the German lines once and for all. 15,000 NZ soldiers went into action, 2,000 lost their lives and nearly 6,000 wounded. Over half of the NZ Somme dead have no known grave. They are commemorated on the NZ Memorial to the Missing in Caterpillar Valley Cemetery. One of these men was returned home to NZ in November 2004, his remains lie in the tomb of the Unknown Warrior outside NZ's National War Memorial in Wellington.

The Battles of the Somme were among the most wasteful of lives of any of the First World War. At the end of 4½ months of fighting up to 1.2 million men had been killed or wounded. The 1st July was the worst day in British military history when 20,000 men were killed and another 40,000 wounded. When the Battle of the Somme ended on 18 November 1916 the Allies had advanced at most 12 km into German held territory - about the distance a fit young soldier could run in an hour.

You may have noticed lately the Coastguard vessel tied up at the Portobello wharf. This is because the trailer is away being fixed.

Here is a report from our Training Officer Gordon Bishop. Gordon has been a great asset to our local organisation since relocating to Dunedin from Whangarei.

“Coastguard has always placed a heavy emphasis on training it’s volunteers, however up until now, the qualifications have only been applicable to Coastguard. The Coastguard Boating Education Service has now received approval for its volunteers courses to be cross-credited to the ‘Skipper Restricted Limits’ qualification, which means that volunteers who complete the Coastguard Masters Qualification are also well on the way to receiving the commercial ticket at minimal cost to the volunteer.

The Coastguard Commercial programme of study consists of eight individual modules, combined with completion of the MNZ Training Record Book (TRB) as a means of verifying experience and documenting the completion of a wide range of practical on-board tasks. These modules are:-

Boatmaster (general seamanship, maritime rules & navigation)

MRROC (maritime restricted radio operator certificate)

GPS (GPS, chart plotters & electronic navigation)

Radar

Inboard Engine Maintenance (inboard marine engine operation and troubleshooting)

Outboard Engine Maintenance (outboard marine engine operation and troubleshooting)

Legal and MOSS (The Maritime Operator Safety System (MOSS) and other applicable legislation)

Working Safely on Commercial Craft (stability, deck machinery and watchkeeping)

Training Record Book (MNZ TRB, seetime and practical tasks)

The first seven of these modules are currently part of the Coastguard volunteers coursework, so anyone wishing to get their commercial ticket only needs to complete the last two to complete the pre-requisite training programme, which is outlined below, and the time spent on any Coastguard Rescue vessel also counts towards the commercial hours required for the ‘Skipper Restricted Limits’ ticket.

This 85 credit programme of study is offered nationwide by Coastguard Boating Education and is applicable to any person wishing to gain the necessary skills and knowledge to be the master/skipper of a vessel of up to 12 meters in length overall, carrying up to 12 passengers within New Zealand restricted limits. It is primarily aimed at those who intend to go on to gain the Maritime New Zealand (MNZ) license “Skipper Restricted Limits” for which this programme of study meets the requirement of a prerequisite approved training programme.”

While several of Coastguard Dunedin’s crew members already have commercial qualifications, this is one of the many benefits our volunteers get from offering their time and abilities as a unit crew member.”

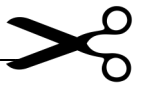
