

LAST BEAT

My last official day of duty is the 20th of April.

I didn't know what to expect when I applied for the vacancy. I had relieved in a number of rural Southland stations and knew there were challenges in sole charge positions, however along with historical family connections and the opportunity to be a sole charge officer was too hard to resist.

One word cannot describe the experience - it's been interesting, challenging, demanding, exciting and rewarding. I've dealt with a wide range of events and situations and many interesting characters and personalities, some famous, some not so famous but fear not there will be no book.

Dealing with tragedies is always difficult as each event plays out differently but in small and tight knit communities the impact is always greater.

I am grateful for the support from many people who have stopped and assisted at crashes, volunteering for search and rescue incidents and back up when dealing with violent offenders when back up was so far away. Without that support the results would have been different.

There is not enough space in this last contribution to thank those who have helped during the past 34 years.

It has been a wonderful place to raise a family in a safe environment. Our two daughters are now living in Geraldine and London and will always have a soft spot for Portobello.

My wife Sharyn and I will remain in Portobello. I will still be involved with Coastguard and the Community Board but will not seek re-election in the next local body elections

There have been many changes in the area the station covers. The biggest impact has been the surge in eco-tourism that has made the Otago Peninsula an international destination. Traffic flows are now 10 times greater than when I started in 1984.

This has put pressure on the environment. The road widening project hopefully will alleviate some of the problems but the tourists are here to stay. I leave with the concern that the Peninsula only has a certain capacity and its critical we manage that so that it doesn't lose its unique identity and character. It's a fine balance between progress and maintaining the status quo.

I have found that I have become an historian by default. It has taken many cups of tea and home baking to achieve that status. In 1984 there was that generation that had direct links to the early pioneers that has provided a rich heritage, character and history of the Peninsula and learnt about some of the colourful characters that lived here. Unfortunately many of that generation has passed on but provided a unique insight to local history but not notwithstanding there are still some colourful characters about today.

The station will remain open. Applicants have been interviewed and I hope the appointment will be finalised before I finish so I can introduce my successor to the community.

Finally I am looking forward to retirement and new challenges but have no regrets for taking this posting.

OTAGO PENINSULA TRUST


Congratulations to Dr John Jillett, who was awarded Life Membership of Otago Peninsula Trust at the March AGM. John was a Trustee 1999 - 2018 and was instrumental in setting up the Otago Peninsula Trust Education Programme, which has seen thousands of school students inspired by learning about our wildlife.

We've 13 albatross chicks this season – with 3-4 nests on view from our observatory, which is great viewing! The albatross chicks are putting on weight nicely and are around the 4-5kg mark. The Little Blue Penguins are finishing their moult and the last chicks are fledging.

There are some great special deals for viewing both albatross and penguins during the Wild Dunedin Festival 20-25 April. We're running the 30 minute Albatross Express tours (\$15 Ad, \$3 child) and the half price family penguin tours during the festival. There's also an amazing film "The Last Ocean – story of a campaign to stop fishing in the Ross Sea" showing daily on our big screen plus a Pesky Pest Hunt at Glenfalloch.

Quarantine Island Kamau Taurua News

It was lovely to host several Peninsula groups on the Island recently - children from Portobello Kindy, Musselburgh School, Bayfield High School, Macandrew Bay Cubs, along with others from the wider Dunedin and Otago community. Exploring the rocky shore, swimming, kayaking, playing, learning about the Island's history and ecology, surveying bird and skinks, controlling weeds, and helping with native seedling revegetation were some of the activities. Volunteers also helped bring over timber for lining the east wall of the Married Quarters and began the daunting task of repainting the exterior.

Weed control is a key focus on the Island – every bit as important as controlling animal pests.

Four QIKT Community members attended the first national Weed Management workshop (offered through the Department of Conservation, with QEII funding). QIKT Community members realised we are relatively lucky- we don't have some of the really nasty weeds that are out there. Of course they could arrive on the wind or via bird poo, so we need to be vigilant, and support the weed control efforts by our neighbours on the Peninsula and West Harbour. We have several weed control days planned for April and May, including a complimentary overnight stay for volunteers, so check the quarantineisland.org.nz website for details.





News from the Otago Peninsula Community Board

So by now we should have recovered from the many visitors we have had for the Ed Sheeran experience. It's been a fantastic thing for the city and the atmosphere it created was exciting and energising. The local weather played ball over the Easter Break and it played its part in the enjoyment of many who visited the area.

Portobello Road - The City Council have advised that the widening of the road will begin in April between Broad Bay and Portobello. This is a very welcome announcement that will no doubt please many in those areas. It seems to have taken an age, but at long last we're on track. More announcements will be made soon on the project timeline.

Tidewater Drive and Otakou Flooding – The Council have recognised that there is a need for work on these areas and have presented plans for both sites. There is to be further discussion with the Tidewater Drive residents, but at this stage it is likely we will see a April start to these works. Thank you to all the landowners who have been so patient.

Public Buses

The ongoing debate with the Otago Regional Council over school pupils getting the public bus continues. While the bus stop issue for Bayfield pupils has been resolved temporarily, the battle over route changes and timetabling continues. The Otago Peninsula deserves better service from public transport provided by the Otago Regional Council. However, we are not the only community that are not having the appropriate service delivered in the community. It's not about asking for special treatment, but asking for what is fair and reasonable to get our kids to school, people to work and our elderly to essential services. I urge all of the community to continue writing to the Regional Council and requesting that the service improve. Long Term Plan – Over the year the Board have undertaken considerable consultation to gauge the needs of the community so that it can be built into the City Council's ten year plan for 2018-2028. That process begins in the next few weeks. By now you should have received information in the mail over the Plan and the submission process. I urge everybody in the community to say something about what you think we need in our community and our city. Whether it's the need for better footpaths, roading, public parks **please have your say**. On that note with the funding issues around the road widening project the community needs to send a message to the City Council that this project must continue for the benefit of our community. If you have any enquiries talk to your Board.

Te Rauone Reserve – I'm pleased to say that the City Council have committed funding to upgrade the reserve over the next three years in tandem with the Port Otago project. This commitment goes a long way to seeing this project over the line for the Otakou and Harington Point Community. For the reserve development there will be an opportunity for community input as part of the project design and I will be facilitating that very soon. This is very exciting for the area.



Museum News



Thanks to Linley for putting fresh wood chips around the memorial rock.




This year Margot Devereux will be one of our speakers. Her family name was Densem (Densem Street in Portobello). Captain John Densem arrived in Otago from Melbourne in the schooner "Pilot" in 1861. He worked in the coastal trade before being appointed Master of the ferry "Peninsula" which belonged to the Harbour Ferry Company. He eventually purchased the ferry, running her between Port Chalmers and Dunedin on the Peninsula side of the harbour. He later became Master of the steamer "Mountaineer" on Lake Wakatipu. John Densem is buried in the Port Chalmers Cemetery.

The Gwyn family of Broad Bay

James and Elizabeth Gwyn and their daughter Elizabeth arrived on the ship "Nourmahal" in 1858.

12 more children were to follow – all born in Broad Bay. Some of these children married into Peninsula families – Christopher and George married into the Leith family from Otakou, Alice to the Grainger family from Broad Bay,



Sarah to the Clearwater family from Broad Bay and Rosina married into the Bayne family. When James arrived in Broad Bay his work consisted of sawing and clearing the bush. He had a spell digging at Gabriel's Gully and Munroe's gold fields but the results were not very encouraging. Returning to Broad Bay he commenced market gardening, which at that time did remarkably well. Frequent trips in a small rowing boat were made to Dunedin, in all weather, to sell his produce.

Before coming to New Zealand James was involved in the Crimean War (1854-56) where he worked in construction of the railway between Balaclava and the trenches. From this he had a very acute form of rheumatism which rendered him an invalid up to the time of his death in 1882. When the Post Office was established in Broad Bay about 1872 he was appointed Postmaster, a position which he held till he passed away. When in fair health he always took his share in Road Board, School Committee and other public work. James and Elizabeth are both buried in the Broad Bay Cemetery.





This February, Otago University hosted the Annual Meeting/Workshop of the NZ Phylogenomics Research group, held once again at the Coronation Hall in Portobello. This was the 22nd annual meeting of this group of scientists. Our annual meetings are held each February at different venues around New Zealand. Following the 2015 meeting in Portobello, the participants requested a return to this attractive venue.

Phylogenomics is the science of interpreting the genomic heritage in DNA and protein sequences. This inter-disciplinary research links together scientists from Biology, Genomics and Biochemistry, with those from Mathematics, Statistics and Computer Science. These week-long annual workshops allow the scientists from these different areas to meet together to discuss their findings and plan future collaborations.

Although originally designed just for the NZ researchers, our meetings regularly attract international participants. This year 41 scientists attended, mostly from NZ universities and CRIs, but included 18 overseas researchers, from Germany, Switzerland, Israel, US, China, Japan and Australia.

Although much of the discussion was on methodology, there were also reports on topical genomics research, such as the Kauri die-back fungus, the influence of poultry production and trade on the spread of avian influenza, bacterial transmission dynamics between hospitals and communities, and the relationship between languages and genetics in Vanuatu.

The participants thank Wayne Cameron and the Hall Committee for their efforts in maintaining this excellent facility in our community, and recommend the Hall as an ideal venue for similar small-group research meetings. The facilities and location, together with the catering from the Penguin Café, proved very attractive to us all.
