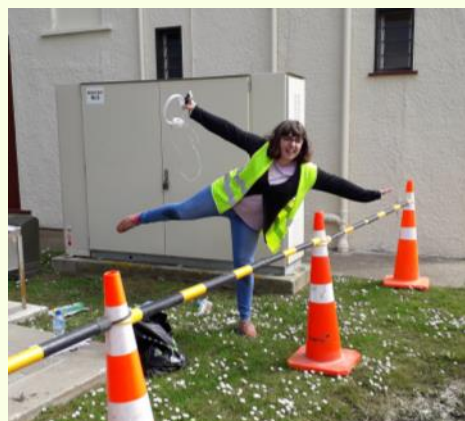

News from the Otago Peninsula Community Board

The beginning of daylight saving is a sure sign that we are well into spring and that summer is at last on its way. We seem to have had some terrific weather lately, long may it continue.

Peninsula Connection - Portobello Road – Work has progressed significantly since the last newsletter and I'm pleased to say that people have been patient and understanding while the work is underway. Some of you may have read the recent article I did with local

policeman Aaron Smith. I was a little disappointed that the article was entitled "*Warning for Peninsula Drivers.*" That wasn't the point of the article at all; it was a reminder to all road users that as we approach summer and the tourist season to take care of one another.

Te Rauone Development – I'm very pleased to see the progress on this project between the community, DCC and Port Otago recently. The community have worked hard on this project and have in the face of considerable adversity prevailed. The "drop in" night at the Marae on September 26th was very well attended and the feedback very positive. There will be another opportunity to look over the plans and discuss the project further on Monday 22 October at 11am, 960 Harrington Point Road, to discuss the plans for the Reserve and the Beach. Tourism Operators Meeting – The Board recently held a very successful meeting with local tourism operators from the Otago Peninsula. The meeting was an opportunity for operators to hear more about the Peninsula connection project and how its operations will affect visitors to the area. It was also an opportunity to meet new operators to the area as they establish on the Peninsula.

Dream Job

I recently spent time at the NZ Marine Studies Centre in Portobello chatting with retiring Manager, Tessa Mills, and looking at the new building. Much has changed over at the “Aquarium” or “Fish Hatchery” as it used to be called. Tessa has worked there for thirteen years and shared some of her stories with me.

Tessa, her husband, Vic, and their three children came to Dunedin from the UK on a teacher exchange programme in 1991. They swapped houses with a Macandrew Bay family and Vic spent the year teaching at Bayfield High School. Their year made a big impression on them, and on their return to the UK they decided they would like to make NZ their home. They were granted permanent residency in 1997 (and there is a whole other story about why it took so long!) and moved into their current home in Broad Bay. Tessa found a job in at Otago University and Vic worked at the Albatross Centre as a guide and educator. It didn’t take Tessa long to become Manager of IT Computer Training, responsible for organizing courses for staff and students at the University.

Tessa would sometimes come down to the Portobello Marine Lab to train the staff working there. While standing behind the desk of the manager of the day and looking straight out across the water to Portobello, Tessa knew “this is where I want to be”. In 2005 the position of Manager of the NZ Marine Studies Centre came up for grabs and Tessa joined the queue with her application. She recalls at her interview she had to confess that she did not know much about “Fish” and wondered how this would impact on her chances of being offered the job. There was also the concern that it was only a two-year contract, so to leave her post in town was a bit of a risk. However, Tessa secured the position with her varied skills, and after the initial two-year contract her position was made permanent, much to her relief.

Highlights during her time at the helm have been many and varied. She says that working in a beautiful location and seeing marine life every day is just wonderful. She recalls arriving at the Centre one morning to see a large pod of dolphins passing by. She has enjoyed the opportunity to learn more about the local marine environment, and to go out on the research vessels – when Hatchery Road was closed she says it was fun going to work on a boat! “There is always something interesting happening here. Even pulling in the plankton net is an adventure – You never know what you will find, from tiny crab larvae, to shoals of krill, and even an occasional seahorse.”

Organising and marketing public events and holiday programmes has been a large part of her job and Tessa has found it rewarding to see what promotional tactics work the best. She explained “There are some key elements that help to grab the attention of journalists when you send out press releases – words like “first”, “biggest”, “rare” and “sex” for example ... and “shark”, “whale” and “octopus” go down well too!” Tessa tried this out when they were about to release a large adult octopus back into the wild. “I thought it would be a great idea to set it free on Valentine’s Day and advertise the fact that we were releasing it so it could go off and find its true love.” She wasn’t quite prepared for what happened next as the story went viral and she received requests for photographs and interviews from all around the world for this romantic story.

Getting to know and be involved in the local tourist industry has been a highlight of her role. Tessa has served on the board of Dunedin Host, has been the regional coordinator for Seaweeek, and has helped to organise the Wild Dunedin Festival and events for the Dunedin International Science Festival. She has loved working with this wide community.

Although it could not compete in size with the many large aquariums around the world, the Portobello Aquarium was popular and unique. “Visitors always commented on the knowledge and enthusiasm of our guides.” The Centre recruits mainly Marine Science students and Tessa says it has been a real pleasure to work with these talented young people over the years and watch their skills develop.

The closure of the Aquarium in 2012 due to earthquake risk on the old building has been a sad loss to Dunedin and the Otago Peninsula. A year before closing to the public the Centre recorded approximately 19,000 casual aquarium visitors, plus 3,500 coming for tours and public workshops and 6,800 school students and teachers to do school programmes. The building was eventually demolished in 2016 and a new teaching lab built in its place. One can only wonder why the Aquarium was not replaced.

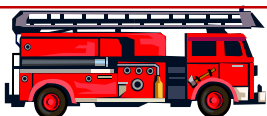
Tessa says the Centre is still busy though, as the school programmes continue, and are well-attended by local schools and schools as far afield as Invercargill, Queenstown and Christchurch. She has also continued to organise workshops and programmes that the public can book onto – such as the dissection of the 2.5 metre Sevengill Shark in September.

This year, with many changes happening at the University, was decision time in Tessa's career. She has decided it is time to get her life back and spend more time at home instead of in the office. Tessa and Vic offer tourist accommodation at their home in Broad Bay and have a large garden, so there is always plenty of work to be done. She is also looking forward to spending more time walking and cycling and just enjoying being on the Peninsula.

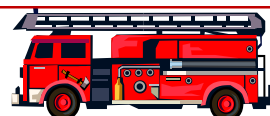
Tessa's dream is to one day see the return of the native bush on the Portobello Peninsula ... so we may see her out there doing a bit of planting.

Portobello Library News

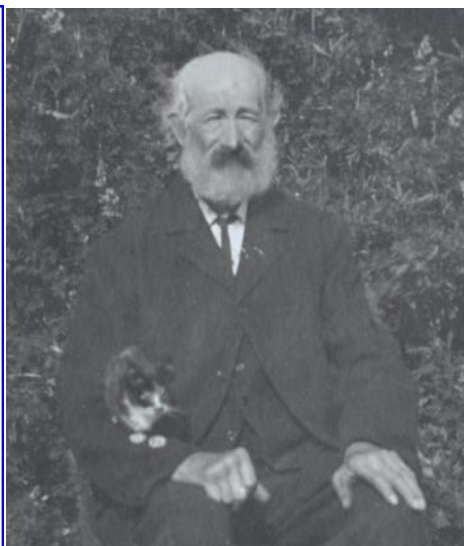
The Portobello Library is open each Thursday morning 11am till 1pm in the Coronation Hall, Portobello.

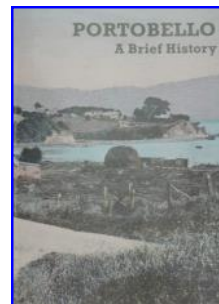

Museum News:

The year is moving along fast. We continue to be busy at the Museum on our usual Tuesday morning working bees. On tidying up the cottage recently we came across a beautiful wedding dress and lots of other treasures. We will try and put some clothes on display for a few months so people can see them. We have been sent a wonderful resource on family trees from an old fellow in Nelson (Gordon McIndoe).

The families are: Bates, Bayne, Beattie, Clearwater, Edwards, Grainger, Gwyn, Hellyer, Leith and Walker (both from Otakou). These families are all related in some way. Also he sent a 1897 map of farm occupiers on the Peninsula, the smallest holding being 11 acres of Robert Cowan's at Highcliff to 2023 acres for the Dickson Brothers of the Cape Saunders area. There are 207 run holders on the map. Most occupiers owned 30 to 80 acres. Please think about putting a copy of your Family Tree at the Museum for future generations to see.

Our book "Portobello - A Brief History" is available for \$25 from the shop or the Museum. The Museum is open on Sundays 12.30-3.30pm and any other time as requested. Thanks go out to all our volunteers who help on a Sunday. We really appreciate your support.



We opened on the Saturday of the Port to Port ferry opening. We hope this service will bring more visitors to the Museum. Even though we only open on Sundays we may consider opening on the occasional cruise ship visit days to see what the interest is. In the meantime the Museum grounds are still open for anyone to wander around and view the outside exhibits.

With the new road widening happening at present we thought it appropriate to write about the early happenings regarding the road.

The Portobello Road Board was formed in 1858. There was also an Otago Heads Road Board, a Peninsula Road Board, Andersons Bay Road Board and a Macandrew Bay Road Board. Tenders were called to clear a track from Andersons Bay to Portobello. All timber and bramble were to be felled to ground level and cleared to leave a clear track at least 20 ft wide. After the opening of the Andersons Bay causeway in 1872 a toll gate was installed. The toll gate closed in 1908.

Toll charges

3 pence - person	2 pence - ridden horse
3 pence - score of sheep	1/2 pence - head of cattle
6 pence - cycle	

Hours: Summer 6am - 8pm Winter 7am - 7pm

Toll money is used for road improvements

Cyclists often carried their bikes around the beach to avoid paying the toll. There was a petition where cyclists wanted the cost reduced from six pence to three pence but this was not granted. Many Dunedin cyclists out for a Saturday or Sunday bike ride only went to the toll gate and turned around - hence it got the name Cape Turnaround. Most people living further down the Peninsula used the High Road so they didn't pay the toll. Remember there were no cars or buses at this time. There are heaps of articles on the Papers Past, Otago Witness, website to read about the comings and goings of the Portobello Road Board. There are interesting letters complaining about the taxes, flooding, culverts, boundaries, fences, state of the roads, stock on roads etc.

From The Otago Witness 10 January 1874

In spite of the many attractions that Dunedin has presented by the numerous amusements provided for holiday folks, Portobello has been visited by as great numbers as on any previous occasion. It has not been favoured by the public appearance in our midst of the eminent personages now visiting the Province. The railway has diverted hence, rather than directed the stream of pleasure seekers to this locality, and yet there was found no lack of them. It is pleasant, too, to record that through this season of hilarity and gaiety, the most excellent order has been preserved. The policeman has not been needed to curb the turbulent, or scare the vicious. There has been greater courtesy shown by the excursionists, and the settlers' fences were never less rudely assailed.

Well daylight savings is finally here and the weather is trying it's best to do the right thing. By the time this goes to print the 1st of around 120 cruise ships will have docked at Port Chalmers bringing many more people down our way. Camper Vans and rental cars are definitely on the increase so keep a sharp look out especially around those corners.

The road works are moving along quite quickly and I have been told that there has been a couple of instances where drivers have overtaken other vehicles within the roadworks (30kmph) signs. I'm not really sure what to think of this, Why would you comes to mind, where's the fire. This type of incident exceeds Careless Driving and is bordering on Dangerous/Reckless Driving.

Significant behaviours contribute to harm on our roads and the main ones are Restraints (Buckle up people it takes all of 2 seconds), Impairment (Alcohol, Drugs and Fatigue), Distraction (Pay full attention and get off that cell phone), and Speed (Those round red and white signs with numbers in the middle them are there for a reason).

Just a reminder about the drink driving levels. None is your best option obviously but if you get stopped and blow over 250 micrograms of alcohol per litre of breath but under 400 you will get a hefty fine and 50 demerit points on your licence. 100 points means you don't have a licence for 3 months. If you blow over 400 then it's a trip in to see the judge. Please be sensible and don't run the gauntlet because we all know the consequences of such behaviour.

I have got to know a fair few of you by now but as I remind myself I have been given the job of being your policeman and enforcing the law, there can be no blurred lines when it comes to doing my job.

There have been a couple of thefts from properties in the Harwood and Harington Point areas in the past few weeks. One from an open garage and the other from a house. A reminder to lock up when you are out and don't give these people the opportunity to steal your stuff. The property taken was a chainsaw and an old style radio. If anyone has any information about these thefts please contact me.

Finally with the school holidays upon us our little ones will hopefully be frolicking in the parks and playgrounds and not behind a device in their bedrooms. Watch out for them on their scooters and bikes please. Until next time stay safe and look out for one another.

STOP News

STOP volunteers have completed the planting for the year at Smiths Creek, the NGL and the Portobello Peninsula Millenium Reserve. Unfortunately Broad Bay School had to cancel due to bad weather so their plants have not yet gone in at Smiths Creek, so we cannot say planting is complete for the year yet.

Darwins barberry

STOP undertook a project, directed by Moira Parker, to try and eliminate this plant from Pukehiki north, and local landowners have been very supportive. This attractive looking plant with its orange coloured flowers – and its prickly leaves - is REALLY OBVIOUS now. (Don't all weeds look pretty when they flower?) Unfortunately, it is lethal, both for pasture where it spreads rapidly and in bush remnants where it suppresses native seedlings. We would like you now to get rid of it from your garden, so that it does not spread back.

Working bees

Regular working bees (weather permitting) will continue at Smiths Creek (meet at the end of Bacon St) every Tuesday at 9.30 -12.30 and Sundays 10am – 1pm, to get on with releasing, gorse cutting and pasting, track maintenance and increasing the natural revegetation areas. Also every Thursday at another site and lately the “War on Weeds” Group has also been organising combined working bees, both for Darwins barberry and gorse.
