Coastguard News:



Our Coastguard unit sold over 4 times our total raffle ticket sales from last year (thanks to our day at Bunnings) and received from Coastguard New Zealand \$250 for being the most improved seller.

Well done and thanks to all involved.

Coastguard Dunedin had a small part to play in the recent Port Otago Open Day on March 25 at Port Chalmers. The vessel along with IRBs from the local surf lifesaving clubs, the rescue helicopter and Police Search and Rescue participated in a demonstration in the harbour basin. The scenario had a small boat with 4 people onboard flip over in the basin, a member of the crew set off an orange smoke flare to signal their distress. The rescue helicopter dropped rescue swimmers into the water to retrieve two of the crew of the distressed boat followed by two IRBs retrieving the other two other crew members from the water and transferred them onto the Coastguard vessel. The Coastguard vessel then towed the empty vessel from the scene.

Back in April last year, my wife Diane and I decided to have a winter vacation in Europe and take advantage of their warm and dry Northern Hemisphere summers. We planned a 23 day cruise boat tour of 11 different countries in the Mediterranean Sea and Aegean Ocean.

Just before leaving to fly to Barcelona in Spain, where our cruise ship Oosterdam was to depart from, we had a catch up with Bob & Laurel Dunn and over a "cuppa" Laurel informed us that if we are calling into Crete, that one of Portobello's favourite sons David Seaton, was buried in the Commonwealth War cemetery in Souda Bay, the sea port of Chania, and that it would be nice to visit his grave site and pay our respects.

As a boy of 16, I used to sail my Z Class yacht at the Port Chalmers Yacht Club, and amongst the trophies we raced for were the Souda Bay and Galatas Cups.

I often wondered why these two cups were named after a sea port and a nearby town in Crete and what was the significance of that.

Having done some research when we came back from Europe, it appears that the donor of these cups was a Mr Vic Lee who had fought in the NZ 19th Battalion in Greece and Crete. He was severely wounded, losing part of his right leg in a stick bomb explosion, and won a Military Medal for bravery in action.

On his return back to NZ he joined the Port Chalmers Yacht Club, and in 1952 donated these two cups in honour of all the Kiwi soldiers who had fought and died in faraway Crete.

Private David Erwin Seaton (Davie) aged 33, the son of Robert and Mary Seaton, was killed in action on the 25 May 1941, in the early days of the Battle for Crete, when thousands of elite German paratroopers began to descend from the sky out of Gliders and aeroplanes, and started their assault on the island's defences comprising of 2800 kiwi soldiers as well as British and Greek troops stationed on the island.

In an excerpt from the Official History of NZ in WW2, 23 Battalion, Chapter 5, Battle for Crete, "Entering from another angle, D Company had its measure of success. The leading platoon, #18 under Lieutenant Cunningham, took the hardest way of entering Galatas by going over walls and through backyards, but this was sound tactics as it enabled some heavy machine gun posts to be outflanked or overrun. When they did find themselves forced to charge up a narrow street, a machine gun held up their attack for a minute or two until Private David Seaton broke the spell by striding forward firing his Bren gun from the hip. While he kept up steady bursts, others edged round to a flank and knocked out the machine gun with grenades. Seaton was killed but the attack surged on again" David's action, and his undoubtedly bravery probably saved some of the lives of his fellow soldiers during this fire fight.

Again, from official war records, more than 1700 British and Greek soldiers were killed, and 15,000 captured during the Battle for Crete. There were 671 New Zealanders among the dead, and 2180 Kiwi prisoners of war. More than 6000 German soldiers were killed or wounded, and the Luftwaffe lost more than 350 aircraft.

The Souda Bay Allied war cemetery site was established by the Australian War Graves Unit after relocating burial grounds from other parts of the Island of Crete after the end of WW2, and contains over 1500 Commonwealth War Graves from WW2. It's set in a beautiful olive grove overlooking Souda Bay, and is immaculately kept by the local council and volunteers from the surrounding area.

We spent part of a lovely sunny afternoon at the cemetery, and were moved by the beauty of the grounds, and the history that it holds in its warm earth. Lest we forget

Its been a difficult few weeks in light of the events in Christchurch in March. People across the country have been shocked and traumatised by the senselessness of a depraved act of pure evil. In light of Christchurch we should all take stock of ourselves and our actions within the community. By this I mean being prepared to put out a hand to your neighbour, supporting people around you and being generous in spirit. Its not about the big gestures that are made now and then, but the small gestures of friendship that you make every day.

Peninsula Connection - Portobello Road – Work has progressed significantly since the last newsletter and I'm pleased to say that people have been patient and understanding while the work is underway. Please keep **May 12th** free for the official opening of Portobello – Broad Bay Section.

Annual Plan 2019 – The City Council proposes a 5% increase in rates this year and we are likely to see a 3% increase in other fees and charges this year. Its very likely that you will see a total increase in rates of around 45% over the next 9 years! For everyone who owns or rents a property that is going to hurt in some way in the future. **I urge every citizen** to engage with the Annual Plan Process and have your say on any of the issues that are raised in the plan. This is only a small part of your time and will become available in coming months.

The Board's Submission to date – I presented to Councillors last week some initial thoughts on the needs of the Peninsula Community. These included:

- Drainage, footpaths and roading infrastructure
- Rubbish, recycling, and toilet upgrades to cope with tourism
- Continued support for pest plant, animal control and biodiversity
- Road maintenance and upgrades
- Track and recreational management, (including playgrounds).
- Completion of the Tomahawk School issues

I will have a second opportunity to present further items in a few months. **If you have anything you'd like to raise, or an issue or project you think should be highlighted** please let me know over the next month.

Delays in an emergency can be devastating


If a fire breaks out, many rural property owners face an increased risk due to their remote location and the distance from the nearest fire brigade. Even when we arrive our response can be compromised by our fire appliance not being able to gain access onto driveways due to overhanging branches or narrow gates and fence lines. There are also issues with no clear pathways to water resources on properties.

In an emergency its critical our fire appliance and crew can get to you as soon as possible. Please ensure your mailbox number or Rapid number is clearly displayed.

Multi Boxes We have still seen some of these being used for the wrong purposes. Please check yours are not overloaded or showing signs of discolouring or cracking. If so REPLACE IT.

If you have not visited us then please come along and check the Museum out. We are open each Sunday 12.30-3.30pm and it is \$2 an adult and children are free.




With ANZAC Day coming up later in the month here are a few newspaper articles about our returned soldiers.

April 1918 - A welcome home was given by the residents of Otakou and Taiaroa Heads on Monday to Sergeant Robertson, Gunner Burns, Private Fowler, Private E. Weir and Private R. Weir. A splendid supper was provided and a number of toasts were drunk with great enthusiasm. Mr Daniel Ellison, the oldest Maori living at Otakou, gave a speech in Maori, which was loudly applauded. He gave a graphic picture of what the boys had gone through at the front. The large audience showed its sympathy for the fallen heroes by standing up in silence for one minute.


July 1918 - An enthusiastic welcome was given to returned Maori soldiers in the Otakou Hall, visitors being present from all parts of the South Island. The proceedings commenced with songs of welcome in Maori, followed by a banquet, at which about 130 people participated. The Chief Karetai was in the chair. Hoani Parata, who recounted some of his experiences with the forces in France, and the opinion of German officers whom he met of the part taken by the British navy in breaking the spirit of the German resistance.

1931 - The ANZAC commemoration service, held at Portobello under the auspices of the local Ratepayers Association was attended by representatives of the Returned Soldiers Association. Mr W. Bennet presided, and a very able and stirring address was given by the Rev. Climie of Broad Bay. The collection in aid of the Poppy Day Fund amounted to £3 8s 9d.

Our book "Portobello - A Brief History" continues to be very popular and a great fund raiser for us. These are available from the Museum or the local dairy for \$25.

The judges were impressed by the huge community effort that has gone into saving and restoring this category 1 historic building over the last 20 years. It felt good to be recognised at the Heritage Awards ceremony, and to receive the David Cox Memorial Award. As you know, so many people and organisations have helped; please look at our website for details of the main ones and apologies if we missed anyone out! Unlike many of the prize-winning buildings, the Married Quarters is accessible to the general public, so if you haven't seen it yet, please do! We have regular open days, or you can arrange your own visit.

Work is continuing on the building. During March, a team from Moana House has been working alongside our builder, Paul Clements, to repaint the exterior. We are impressed by the Moana House residents' determination to turn their lives around for the better, for themselves and their whanau, and the caring staff who help to make this happen. We are grateful for grants from the Otago Community Trust and Alexander Mc Millan Trust to fund this project.

Other visitors in March have included students from local school, including Musselburgh and Bayfield. We've also hosted groups from Polytech and University, as well as groups of family and friends looking for a special nearby place to spend a weekend. During their stay,



many visitors have helped with watering seedlings given the long dry period, some planting, and biodiversity monitoring. We are always looking for people who have done these activities before to help supervise other 'new' volunteers. Please let us know if you can help.

Peninsula Connection construction update from Fulton Hogan:

Construction of the Peninsula Connection project at Section 8 between Turnbulls Bay and Portobello is nearly complete. The grand opening will be held in early May and we will advise you of the details soon.

Construction of Section 2 between Vauxhall and Glenfalloch is well underway. Bulk fill used to widen the road and construction of the new stone wall has progressed through to Weller Street. Construction of the road pavement will be starting shortly.

Please remember to mind your speed when travelling through the site for the safety of our staff.

We wish to thank you for your ongoing patience during construction and hope to see you at the Section 8 official opening.

Te Rauone Beach Project

At the Public Meeting held on 22 October 2018 at Harington Point, the guest speakers Kevin Winders CEO of Port Otago Ltd, and Rachael Eaton and her team from Dunedin City Council outlined their proposals for the beach renourishment/groynes construction project, and the redevelopment of Te Rauone Reserve.

The meeting, attended by about 100 people, unanimously accepted both proposals and asked the parties to implement them as soon as possible.

The engineering design by BECA for Port Otago is now almost finalised with some minor variations.


Port Otago will soon begin the consultation process with affected parties, a process more or less a repeat in part of the earlier proposal.

When discussions are completed Port Otago will then lodge the Application for Resource Consent, hopefully by July 2019.



ANOTHER DAY IN PARADISE from Olly's pen

Gosh we are so fortunate to live out here – in the open spaces where the air is clear and where people pretty much know one another. There's something about living on the Peninsula. I get a strong sense of local pride. 'Portobello, Harwood, Harington Point? That's too far out of town,' someone said to me the other day. But then again up at the marae some elders chuckled and told me, 'That's fine by us – we prefer to keep it that way. We don't want too many people coming out here. We like things just the way they are.' I know what they mean - even though we've only been here for five years – it seems longer than that somehow.

We've bedded the main garden down for the winter and planted more silver beet and winter greens to keep us in supply come the cold season. The rats and mice seem to be doing the same thing – rolling the walnuts from our tree into their nests inside the walls and ceilings. We really don't like sharing our space with them. So we're trying out different electronic devices to the Pestrol ones we've had. We thought the little beggars had gone for good but – now they're back. They must have got used to them. I'll let you all know how this lot works out.

We've stocked up on wood as well – some good ole dry macrocarpa which we'll mix with pine. And the weather is changing too. You can feel the Autumn just around the corner. And ole Jacko Frosto is letting us know he's right there too, waiting to have a go - in the deadly hours of the early morn he sweeps and glides at the break of dawn an invasion slow and as cold as ice trying his best to nudge out the warmth but he won't succeed - why?

This is paradise.

Important update from your local member of parliament

A pay boost of \$1.20 an hour to lift the minimum wage to \$17.70, the largest increase in history.

The new adult hourly minimum wage is \$17.70 per hour. This Government believes in sharing prosperity more fairly. That's why we've increased the minimum wage by \$1.20 per hour, recognising that many New Zealand workers do need more to make do. Unemployment is low, the economy is strong, and the Government books are in good shape. Now is exactly the time to improve wages.

The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment estimates that up to 209,200 people received a pay increase yesterday of up to \$48 per week. Women, young people, Māori, and Pasifika are overrepresented in minimum wage roles, and around a quarter of those earning the minimum wage are parents or guardians. This Government is committed to increasing the well-being of all New Zealanders, and steps like this make that a reality.

Rates of New Zealand Superannuation and Veterans Pension will increase by 2.6 percent, reflecting the bigger increases in wages under this Government.

New Zealand Superannuation and Veteran's Pension are paid fortnightly on a Tuesday. How much you get depends on your situation. From 1 April these rates will increase as one of several changes intended to grow the economy and improve the wellbeing of New Zealanders.

Early results from my electorate wide survey

I recently distributed a survey into 23,000 letterboxes across the Dunedin South electorate. The response rate was greater than expected. For the Peninsula the local issues relating to predator-free, sea level rise, public transport and land stability seem to be the most prominent. More broadly from the surveys looked at so far (700+), the indications are as follows. Changes that you are most aware of relate to hospital rebuild, the use of plastic bags, Pike river investigation, minimum wage increases and winter energy payments. The two areas constituents seem to have benefit most from last year have been the winter energy payments and lower GP fees. At the time of the survey in February the following issues were most concerning the electorate – changes to NZ Post / Kiwibank; Climate change; water quality; fuel prices; and, sea level rise. These are indicative so far and I will follow up with more detail soon.

Gun law reform: Why we are taking swift, decisive action:

The Government is taking action in response to the March 15 terrorist attack to protect New Zealanders and keep us safe

Remember why we're doing this – 50 men, women and children were killed by a terrorist wielding these military style weapons.

New Zealanders are with us:

Gun reform is widely supported – including by farming and hunting groups. Fish & Game said yesterday 'while it is quick it's the right approach' Submissions have been pouring in and they will be considered.

What we are doing:

This legislation is straightforward – we are banning all military style semi-automatics and assault rifles that are designed to kill people to make our country a safer place

There are two stages to these reforms

The first stage is the ban on military style semi-automatics and assault rifles. These are only designed for one thing. They are killing machines.

Stage two will consider matters in more depth and that will be subject to a longer public hearings process, if people feel we've got something wrong with this change or we've left something out.

Response to those who suggest the process is too fast

We need gun reform now, any move to slow down the process is a move to stop it

New Zealanders have made their expectations clear that they want guns out of their communities as soon as possible

Gun buy-back

Details of the buyback will be confirmed shortly but Police are already collecting bank account details from people who are taking part in the gun amnesty (via the online form on the Police website) and they are well placed to begin paying compensation once details are confirmed and buy-back begins


