The past couple of months have been busy for myself and the Fire Brigade guys and gals. There have been a few incidents that have tested all of our skills and abilities. I want to firstly thank all of the Brigade team for their assistance, professionalism and support during these trying and not so pleasant times for emergency services. You guys rock.

Well we are one month into winter and as I look out the window there is clear blue sky. However the mornings now have the potential to be very icy on our roads. I have already attended a couple of crashes where the frost was a factor. One of these crashes occurred when the driver was doing about 35kmph around a moderate bend in a 50kmph zone so this just shows how unforgiving and unpredictable the frost and ice can be. Please take extra care over the remaining winter months.

I'm sure most of you will have seen or heard of the new number to call police if there is not an emergency and you wish to report a crime or pass on information. This is **105**. Please use this number if you need to contact me or report a crime. I am not always working or around so this is the best way. Of course if you need immediate assistance please use 111.

Driving complaints continue to come in. I have been told that many of you post these incidents and your frustrations on the Facebook page. What I would love to see is that if you believe it is worth complaining about then please contact police. It doesn't have to be at the time but is preferred. The *555 number is still operational. Otherwise take down a registration number and come and see me. I can't do anything if I don't know about it. Also keep on watching out for the cyclists and be patient around them.

A couple of weeks ago a Large Mikasa Plate Compactor was stolen from the Fulton Hogan site near Bacon Street. This is a large (>400kg) machine worth over \$10,000. It would had to have been hoisted onto a trailer. I am following a couple of lines of enquiry but if anyone has any further information please come and see me. You have my word that the information and your identity will remain totally anonymous. If the machine happened to turn up somewhere even better.

Finally I think it is fitting to remind everyone to keep an eye out for each other. The pressures and complexity of society today impact us all in different ways. If you notice something different about a friend, family member or acquaintance don't be afraid to ask that question "ARE YOU OK?" If you yourself are having any difficulties there are a lot of helplines available, don't be too proud to reach out and it goes without saying my door and ear is always open.

News from the Otago Peninsula Community Board

We've gone past the shortest day as we all come to grips with winter and all that it throws at us. The arrival of frosts has removed any sense that winter has been slow in arriving. Its also a reminder that all Peninsula residents should take care on the road as winter conditions take their toll.

Peninsula Connection - Portobello Road – The recent opening of the Broad Bay to Portobello section of the Peninsula Connection Project was very well attended by nearly 300 people. It was heartening to see so many people turn up on bikes, scooters and Shanks' Pony to enjoy the hospitality of Fulton Hogan. It was also a little sad to know that this would be the last occasion the community would see Fulton Hogan project manager Winston Smith who has done a sterling of working with the community and the Board in getting this project over the line for our area.



Road as the Peninsula Connection project continues the Board ensured that the wood from those trees be stored for future firewood fundraising projects by the community. The wood is open to any group raising funds for an appropriate cause. Groups will be required to take all responsibility for the health and safety of their volunteers and all equipment and vehicles. If you'd like to raise funds from the firewood for a local project or group please get in contact with myself or Lox Kellas from the Community Board.

Firewood Fundraising – With the removal of the trees along Portobello Road as the Peninsula Connection project continues the Board ensured that the wood from those trees be stored for future firewood fundraising projects by the community. Wellers Rock – Te Umu Kuri – The Board, DCC, DoC and the Otakou Runaka has been working together on the management of the area. Concerns have been raised about inappropriate vehicle use and freedom camping activities. To date the group has worked constructively together and appropriate solutions that will continue to allow boat launching and visiting to site agreed upon. In coming months, more information will be sent out to the community and an opportunity to see these will be available.



Short & Sweet

Te Rauone Beach – Continued work by the committee with Port Otago & the DCC on both the reserve development and the coastal erosion project.

Playgrounds at Macandrew Bay and Portobello are having their safety surfaces renewed.

The Board has funded 3 youth scholarships for Hannah Cross (Ice Hockey trip to Romania, Phoebe Whittam (Spirit of Adventure) and Tasman Charteris-Wright (Spirit of Adventure). Congratulations girls you are great ambassadors for the Otago Peninsula.

The water leaks at Moerangi and Solar Terrace have been repaired, other sites are still ongoing.

The \$20 million required to continue the Peninsula Connection project has been granted by the DCC in the Annual Plan.

Civil Defence and the Board will be putting out a preparedness plan for the Otago Peninsula.

Local government elections are coming up, **don't forget to register and don't forget to vote!**

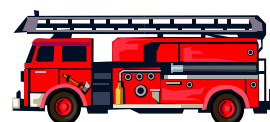
Quiz Night

In 1950 it would take 10 to 15 minutes to destroy a home and contents today it takes only 2 to 3 minutes to destroy everything you own. The plastics, synthetic stuffing and other materials found in modern furnishings burn faster and give off more poisonous smoke than ever before. In 80% of house fires smoke alarms were either not installed or not working.

Museum News

John, Elizabeth and Will Dougall - late 1880's

The Dougall Family of Quarantine Island

John Alexander Dougall was born in Edinburgh in 1824. He married Elizabeth Lawrence in Melbourne in 1858. They had 6 children, the eldest 2 born in Australia and the other 4 on Quarantine Island.

The Dougalls were the first "Keepers" of the Quarantine Station on the Island and were there from 1861 till 1924.

In the early days lots of ships arrived with passengers having infectious diseases so the passengers were quarantined on the Island for a given period. Nobody else was allowed on the Island without a permit from the Health Department.

John died in 1890 and his wife Elizabeth carried on as "Keeper" until youngest son Will was old enough to take over. He lived there with his wife Hester (nee Allan) and 3 daughters, Isabella (Bell), Margaret (Madge) and Gwenyth (all born on the Island).

In 1917 the Military took over the Island so a "Keeper" was not required. Will was transferred to the Dog Island Lighthouse off Bluff, while Hester and the 3 girls lived in Portobello. 9 months later the war had ended and the family returned to the Island.

Bell recalls there was a lighthouse situated at the far end of Quarantine Island to guide steamers through the channel between the Island and Goat Island. She helped with cleaning the windows, the reflector and the lamp globe plus trim the wick and fill the lamp daily.

In 1924 the Health Department decided to close the Quarantine Station and the family were transferred to Motuihi Island in the Hauraki Gulf.

John Dougall and 3 of his children died on the Island and are buried in the cemetery.

STREET LIGHTING IN PORTOBELLO.

SUCCESSFUL OPENING FUNCTION.

A very successful function was held at Portobello last evening, when the electric lights in the streets were switched on for the first time. There are altogether some 30 lights, extending over a distance of about a mile on the city side of the Beach road, and for some three-quarters of a mile up the High road, as well as about half a mile along the lower side of the township. The gathering was presided over by Mr P. W. Moss, and the chairman of the Electric Power and Lighting Committee (Mr J. B. Shacklock) was in attendance.

Mr Moss, in his opening remarks, stated that the new system of lighting had not been introduced without a great deal of work on the part of the Portobello and Broad Bay Ratepayers' Association, which in its efforts had the wholehearted support of the local residents. Special mention, the speaker said, must be made of the work which had been done by Mr Bowles, who had been ably assisted by the county clerk (Mr B. Noble) and the county engineer (Mr S. G. Paterson).

Mr Shacklock said that it gave him a great deal of pleasure to be present that evening, and he wished to congratu-

late the residents of Portobello on their initiative in taking a forward step such as this. He wished, especially, to congratulate Mr Bowles, who had been largely responsible for the introduction of electric light in the streets of the town. He hoped that the surrounding districts such as Broad Bay and Macandrew Bay would follow suit, and go in for an up-to-date system of street lighting. Electric lights were a thing which were appreciated more as they were used and their convenience became known. He was sure that the residents would never regret the step they had taken, and that the number of lights would soon be increased.

Mr W. Gibson, of the North-East Harbour Ratepayers' Association, also congratulated the residents of Portobello. As a similar step to the one taken in Portobello was being contemplated by the residents of Macandrew Bay, he was in a position to appreciate the work involved. He hoped that before long the whole of the Peninsula would be supplied with electricity.

The Rev. W. M'Arthur said that he wished to mention the high standard of the work which had been done by those entrusted with the actual installation of the electric light.

A programme of songs was rendered by the following:—Mr George Walters, Miss Isobel M'Arthur, Mr and Mrs Robertson (duet), and Messrs Brown, Ellison, Potiki, and Miss Ellison (quartet).

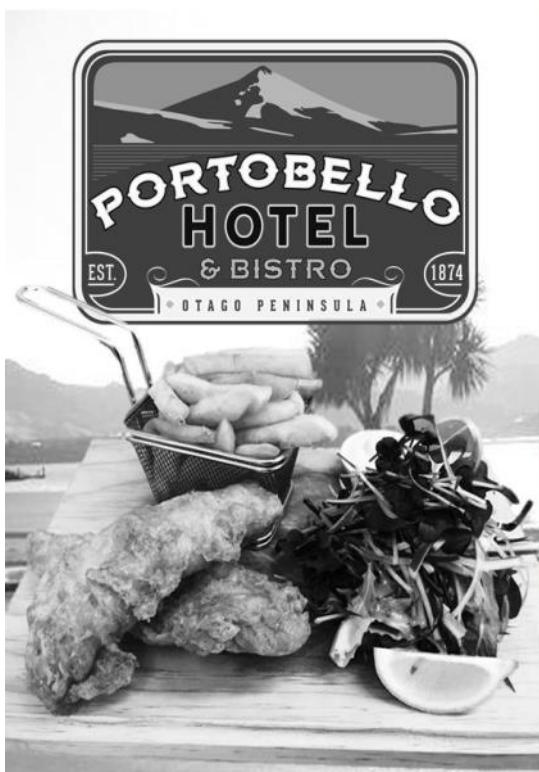

The OPBG has, so far, removed over 17800 possums from the Otago Peninsula.

The big question is after all these years and all that work, how many possums can possibly be left?

This is a hard question to answer because, once possums get to low numbers, it is much harder to detect them. But you can help out, by reporting possum activity in your garden/on your land/on your dog walking route by using our "report a peninsula possum" button on our very smart new website:

<http://www.predatorfreepeninsula.nz/> .

You will often hear possums call at night when there are other possums in the area, and their calls have been described as hisses, screeches and chatters. Physical signs include droppings under food trees (about 2.5 cm long and as thick as a pencil, in case you wanted to be precise), scratch marks on trees and fence posts and horizontal bites on trees.

Possums can travel long distances and are able to re-invade areas that have previously been cleared. You can imagine that an area that has been cleared of possums is now full of regrowing plants and nesting birds and is the equivalent of a lolly shop for a possum. So please keep an eye, and an ear, out for signs of possums and let us know so that, together, we can work towards making the Otago Peninsula possum-free.

ANOTHER DAY IN PARADISE

A tukutuku or decorative lattice panel that looks like a series of uniform stairways stacked one on top of the other, found between carved figures in some ancestral meeting houses on marae, is attributed as symbolically saying in a visual way; **Ma te wa**, which means there is a time for everything, both positive and negative. I'm a firm believer in cause and effect and when I was told by my mother and other elders from different iwi that the poutama symbolises the ages and stages of life's different journeys I got hooked. My curiosity got the better of me and I began to research the poutama to see what else it was about.

Its application to life, like all of the other decorative panels in our meeting houses contain multiple layers of meaning. All in all the carved and decorated ancestral meeting house symbolically tell us that all the wisdom we require is contained within ourselves. As we make decisions and choices throughout our lives we have the potential to change and shape things to suit ourselves. How far that potential can be taken is not yet fully and scientifically known. Theoretically – there is no limit. Why? Is it true that all physically man made things were merely thoughts put into action? That the driving force we have at our disposal is passion? And that passion moves us to act upon our ideas? So rationally then, does it follow that therefore, houses, cars, furniture, vehicles, carpets, blinds, electronic devices i.e. anything physical etc... began as a thought in someone's mind?

Many minds united in one passionate focus has proven over the years to be very powerful indeed – like these people who inspired the masses: Princess Te Puia, Te Whiti O Rongomai, Rua Kenana, Ratana, Kate Shepherd, David Lange, Edmund Hilary to name a few. People who made us really think – and there are many at different phases of our lives – they're all in the same category because they fired up our thoughts.

So, when enough of us believe that this place is a unique piece of paradise, will that become a fact? How will we know? Or maybe there are enough of us already. And that's why I believe it – hmm.

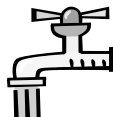

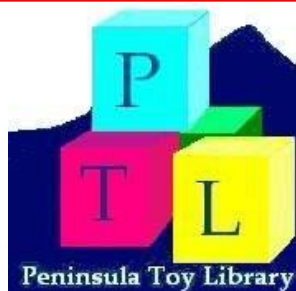

Building a productive and engaged nation

To stay ahead in the digital age, we need to make sure we stay at the cutting-edge of technology and innovation. This government is introducing initiatives that support businesses to become more productive and to help New Zealand transition to a low-carbon future.

We're also bridging the venture capital gap, with a fund for start-ups to grow and succeed. We are investing in New Zealanders by making sure they are equipped with the skills they need to adapt and succeed as their workplaces change. We're reforming our vocational education system and getting more people into apprenticeships and trade training, with opportunities for nearly 2,000 young people through the expanded Mana in Mahi programme.

The Wellbeing Budget announced at the end of May builds on our work with the School Leavers Toolkit, a programme of civics knowledge and skills, budget advice, and key workplace know-how, to better equip young people for life after leaving school.

Part of the role of government is to engage and encourage our communities to engage with our parliamentary process that forms an important part of our democracy.

This week students at Macandrew Bay and Bathgate Park Schools will get the chance to meet the Speaker of the House, Trevor Mallard, on Friday.

The visit is part of the Speaker-led Outreach Programme that aims to bring Parliament to the people and the Speaker will be accompanied by myself and other MPs from across Parliament.

The reason for these visits, like civics knowledge, is to make Parliament more accessible to enhance its public perception, and increase public participation in New Zealand's democratic process.

Students and indeed all New Zealanders need to know that they can easily and effectively engage with Parliament, no matter their age or background. It's not always possible for people to visit Wellington and these visits are one way of connecting Parliament to the Public.
