Updates from the Otago Peninsula Community Board

As I write this, I'm mentally preparing myself for ritually putting the clock back after daylight saving. To say I'm a little sad that another mixed summer is over, and we barrel towards the darkness of winter would be an understatement. Frankly, I'm a fair-weather person at the best of times and adding darkness to the cold fills me with a seasonal dread akin to having relatives come to stay who you don't particularly like.

Dunedin City Council Long Term Plan 2025-2034

The Dunedin City Council Long Term Plan is a vital one for the Otago Peninsula to have the roading widening project completed for the benefit of our community. The Portobello School Section, Ōtākou Fisheries and inland route from Harwood are essential for the safety and sustainability of the Peninsula. It's essential that the community get behind these projects by submitting to the Long-Term Plan. Submissions close at 12 noon on 30 April 2025. Submissions can be made by visiting: www.dunedin.govt.nz/council/currently-consulting-on and clicking on "Draft 9 Year Plan". Alternatively, you can write to, Dunedin City Council, PO Box 5054, Dunedin 9054. Please have your say!

Water Done Well Submissions

Local Water Done Well (LWDW) is the Coalition Government's plan to address Aotearoa New Zealand's long-standing water infrastructure challenges. The Dunedin City Council is required to prepare and submit a Water Services Delivery Plan by 3 September 2025.

The Council must identify its arrangements for delivering water services to the community. Two options are being considered:

1. Water services remain in-house (preferred option),

2. Water services are managed by a new Council-Controlled Organisation (CCO).

Submissions close on the 30th of April and I encourage all residents to submit their opinions on this important issue. Submissions can be made online at www.dunedin.govt.nz/council/council-projects/local-water-done-well-reform or by writing to the Dunedin City Council, PO Box 5054, Dunedin 9054

Otago Regional Council Public Transport Plan

Recently, many children and parents in our community face the daily challenge of securing a place on the public transport service from the city to the Otago Peninsula. The bus, especially during school hours, is often full, leaving many young people stranded at stops and unable to reach their destinations. The Board presented a petition of 600 signatures to the ORC asking for increased afternoon services to solve the problem.

Public consultation for the Draft ORC Regional Public Transport Plan 2025-2035 commenced on 24 March with the submission period closing on 2 May 2025. In-person consultation sessions will be held from 25 March to 16 April. 
Our visitor numbers have improved lately which we are very happy about as it makes our volunteer involvement all the more satisfying to share with folk.

McTainsh Family of Sandymount

The photo is of Alison and Peter McTainsh in July 1850 on their wedding day in Lasswade, Midlothian, Scotland. With

two older step children and their own three young children they set sail for Port Chalmers as Assisted Immigrants on the ship Gloucester, arriving on 26 December 1858.

The family's first home was the Immigration Barracks in Dunedin (temporary accommodation for new arrivals) where their daughter Maggi was born in March 1859.

Later that year, for the sum of five pounds, Peter purchased a ten acre Crown Grant section near Tomahawk lagoon. In 1865 he purchased 80 acres of land at Sandymount, naming it Stony Hill. Peter died at Sandymount in 1876 aged 57 and was laid to rest at the Andersons Bay Cemetery. His son John took over the running of the farm. Daughter Maggie (Mrs Scott) lived in Broad Bay and is buried in the Broad Bay Cemetery.

Backyard Trapping

Now is a great time of year to set your traps and refill rodent bait boxes for rats and mice.

As colder weather approaches, rodents will seek warmth and shelter—often in your home, sheds, compost bins, or hen houses.

For best results, place traps and bait stations along the exterior walls of your home, in sheds, near compost bins and hen houses, under the house, or in the ceiling cavity. (Note: placing traps in the ceiling cavity can reduce interference but carries the risk of unpleasant odours if a rodent dies there.)

SWAT goes offshore!

SWAT had perfect weather in late March for our annual visit to Goat Island/Rakiriri, the steep sided, bush clad island located between Quarantine Island/Kamau Taurua and Port Chalmers. This 4.5ha rocky island is a Scenic Reserve, administered by DoC and much of it is covered in thick low forest with a dense ground cover of ferns. However there is a surprising diversity of plant species including tōtara, miro, fierce lancewood and unusual ferns. As this island is an important stepping stone for birds traversing the harbor, it is important to keep the native trees there from being strangled by invasive vines.

Our main targets for the day were the two troublesome pest vines Banana passion fruit and Bomarea, but hawthorn, spindleberry, rangiora, cotoneaster and boxthorn were also on the hit list.

After the essential health and safety talk, we headed up the narrow main track, with small groups heading off in different directions so as to cover as much of the island as possible. As a result of many years controlling the passion fruit here, much of the understory was clear of seedlings. But, this is a tricky place to navigate with steep cliffs on both sides so a small area can easily be missed. One such area was hiding a sizable banana passion fruit vine. We reckon the sack of fruits in the photo collected from this one vine weighed around 12kg!

It was great to have a team of four from Aukaha who got the toughest job, cutting and poisoning some massive boxthorn

After the introduction, we'll have a relaxed group play-along and time to ask questions - about ukuleles, chords, strumming and more. Then, stick around for a chat and some snacks.

shrubs on the northern slopes of the island. Seabirds can get caught in the spines on boxthorn so it was satisfying to deal to this nasty shrub that flourishes on coastal cliffs.



One of the rewards of spending hours killing pest plants is finding something quite unexpected. This was the case when we stumbled across a 4m tall mataī, a species previously not seen on the island. SWAT makes sure that these observations are recorded so photos are taken and uploaded onto iNaturalist. This is the link to the mataī <https://inaturalist.nz/observations/266192019>

This was SWAT's 4th visit to the island and we have seen noticeable changes. The predominant vines are now native clematis and parsonsia happily co-existing with the forest, instead of the rampant invaders. There are also fewer hawthorns and spindleberry but on the other hand both rangiora and Cotoneaster appear to be spreading. So we have a good excuse to return next year. This small island with no possums, sheep or rabbits has a wonderful array of plant species and deserves to be looked after. Thanks to John McLaughlan of the Vivienne J for transporting our group.

Quarantine Island/Kamau Taurua Community Inc.

Kia ora koutou,

Over the past few months, Island Keeper, Jon Clark, has been kept busy hosting many groups choosing to stay a night or two in St Martin Lodge. A number of groups of families and friends enjoyed some 'Island time', and two weddings were held in February, both hiring out the Married Quarters building and the Lodge.

The Untouched World Foundation, who have run education for sustainability programmes for over 22 years, partnered with the School of Fashion at Otago Polytechnic Design School and chose the Island to bring students over in February for a 4-day full-immersive fashion-focussed sustainability programme entitled Fashion Reimagined. A group from Dunedin Homeschoolers stayed in March and members of the Otago Entomology Society stayed overnight whilst undertaking a bioblitz invertebrate survey. Autumn Equinox 5-day mindfulness retreaters released seedlings, grubbed thistles, weeded the steps, and bush track maintenance during their stay, and the W.E.E. Treat (Women's Empowerment Experience) returned in early April.

Students from Bayfield High School held a week-long Camp in February, and Roxburgh, Lawrence, Maniototo, East Otago High and Twizel Area Schools held a joint Camp in March, and Broad Bay School held an overcamp in early April and helped to release seedlings during their stay. Waitaki Girls High School and St Kevin's College, Ōamaru, also stayed whilst attending the NZ Marine Studies Centre education programme. Day visitors included students from Otago Girls High School, Trinity College, and Anderson's Bay School.

Our regular weekend mahi volunteer days and monthly Welcome Days have been enjoyed by new visitors and regular volunteers/Community members. Bush track and path maintenance has continued to be a focus for Community members and volunteers, alongside caring for native seedlings, weed control, maintaining and monitoring predator traps and tracking tunnels, and the autumn bird counts have begun. Other mahi included Lodge cleaning, building maintenance and the completing the cemetery fence.

Thanks to all our volunteers and Community members for their efforts on and off the island over the last few months.



Special thanks to Ross Lewis, for his extensive mahi in the Reserve paths and bush loop track and for supporting Jon with the Andy Bay School day trips. Thanks also to Port-To-Port Cruises and Wildlife Tours, East Coast Charters and Otago Water Taxis & Tours for boat transfers.



Another Day In Paradise—from Olly's Pen

Kia ora anō! Here I am again pounding away on the computer keyboard. My guitar's been sitting in the corner of the TV room upstairs and I realised, gee I hadn't played it for a while. So I took it out and strummed a few notes and had a wee jam session all by myself. I sang one of the songs I wrote about three of the Māori symbols – the koru which is the spiral of life, the poutama – the stairways of life and learning and my favourite one; the pātiki – the love energy of life. I'm happy with the lyrics and the structure of the rhythms but there's something not quite right about the chords yet. But I'm working on it. And that's made my fingers hurt. They've gotten soft again because I haven't played for so long. I also realised how much joy singing and playing the guitar gave me. I missed it – like a long lost friend. So I spent a good hour just messing around enjoying my guitar and singing my heart out. Something I'm going to do on a regular basis from now on. My Mum and Dad loved dancing and Mum enjoyed singing while Dad played the piano and button accordion. Our family was quite large and we all learnt to play musical instruments. I'm the 19th child, the pōtiki. I really loved playing the saxophone but I cashed it in when I bought my

first house. I also played clarinet, guitar and piano. As a kid growing up in the Urewera, miles from anywhere, we made our own entertainment. Whenever there was a wedding or special occasion, people brought their instruments and everyone would have a ball. Of course lots of them sang lead accompanied by backup singers in four part harmony. I miss that. I don't hear that often any more – people automatically harmonizing. The wonderful thing back then was everyone appreciated jamming, dancing, laughing and sharing that time with one another. One of my uncles always acted as the MC at large events in our village. He was recognised as the best singer in our area. His name was Sunshine and he was a great entertainer who literally spread sunshine wherever he went. My family said that he always had a great big smile on his face and that it made his face shine like the sun – that's how he got his name. I never got to know him by any other name. Music makes the heart sing and so does a big smile I was told by one of my teachers. I believe that too now – like who wouldn't – in our slice of paradise!
