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Portobello School

NOHO

Our annual noho to Ōtākou Marae was last month. This is a large undertaking for our kura and is a highlight for many of our tamariki who look forward to it every year.

We started with our pōwhiri and then tamariki were split into groups and took part in each rotation. We had Lisa sharing her 'Toroa: Sky Call' video game with us, Stacey teaching us how to make putiputi from harakeke and Connor was working with us on our mau rākau skills. After lunch, we each designed and decorated a set of rākau. Our walk to Weller's Rock was great, if a little cold. After dinner, the senior students did some baking while the juniors listened to some stories wonderfully retold by Kitty.



ACTIVITIES

On Monday the 5th of May, Mrs Agnew took Ivy, Bella and Robin to the DCC submissions. They spoke on behalf of our kura about the Peninsula Connection Project, Te Aka Ōtākou. They were great advocates for our school and conducted themselves with mana and pride.

Milo mornings have restarted for winter. The senior class run these mornings as a fundraiser for the Y5-8 camp in November.

The Kindy have been using the tree reserve every Friday. It is great that we have the Kindy so close that they can do this. Our seniors are visiting the Kindy every week, spending time with the Kindy tamariki, strengthening the bond between Kindy and School.

We are going to be adding to our parihaumia uniforms with a few extras, building up our stocks and ensuring we have enough uniforms in the sizes we need.

We are also going to be purchasing some piupiu to go with our new uniforms. These will compliment the look we already have. We will build up our stocks of these over the coming years as well.

CURRICULUM

Our topic learning this term is based on the atua, Tūmatauenga. Classes are focusing on the history of New Zealand and some of the conflicts that have occurred.

In maths, classes are working hard on various aspects of the curriculum. Junior whānau are learning about place value, number order and spatial reasoning, while Room 3 have been learning about fractions and money. Room 5 are

learning about geometric shapes and area, with Room 4 working in the Geometry strand, revisiting how to use a protractor, learning about acute, obtuse, right, and reflex angles, also complimentary and supplementary angles.

On Wednesday 11th of June, Portobello School hosted teachers from Grants Braes, Waihola, Macandrew Bay and Broad Bay schools, along with Sue from The Learner First. The Learner first is a company that delivers maths professional development.

MATARIKI BREAKFAST

Our annual Matariki breakfast happened on the 19th of June in the Hui room. It was great to see so many whānau joining us for this special event. It highlights to me our values, but especially Kotahitaka and Whanaukataka. Sharing kai and time spent as a group brings us all closer together. The tamariki worked hard on their items and were proud to share them. The smell of bacon cooking and coffee brewing and the sound of people enjoying themselves is very special indeed.

IMPROVEMENTS

The school is a hive of activity during the school holidays, as well. We are getting carpet laid in the non-classroom spaces, the Junior whānau and Room 4 windows are getting replaced with double glazed units and the office/reception area is getting a long overdue upgrade. We look forward to coming back to school in term 3 with these changes having been done in the holidays.

Tēnā koutou everyone,

As I pen this, I am into my 4th week back after an annoying and frustrating 9 months off due to my injury. I am so pleased to be back up and running as sitting idle does not sit well with me. It has been a struggle, especially since the better half broke her ankle in October and spent 3 ½ month post-surgery staring at me and getting me to do jobs...ha ha. Well jobs I could do with one operational hand anyhow.



I want to firstly thank Constable Mike for stepping into the breach and taking care of all things down here on the Peninsula for the time he was here. He did a great job and got some good results including recovering a very expensive mountain bike stolen in a burglary from Portobello and identifying a separate offender for another burglary in Ōtākou. Nice work mate.

I suppose this segueways into keeping our property safe and out of sight, if possible, from those that like the old five finger discount. The bike was stolen by a visitor from the city and occurred in the early hours of the morning. WINTER FIRE SAFETY

It's definitely winter now, and this raises new challenges around keeping ourselves safe.

Every year, as temperatures drop, we see a significant increase in the number of house fires. Our winter fire safety campaign is "see a fire before it starts". This will decrease fire risks associated with the use of electric blankets, heating appliances and dryers.



ELECTRIC BLANKETS

A faulty electric blanket is a fire waiting to happen. If you feel any unusually hot patches in your electric blanket, or if it is more than 5 years old, replace it now.



CHIMNEY FIRES

Although chimney fires aren't as common in modern wood burners, burning anything except dry seasoned wood can lead to a build up in the flue. If your flue isn't maintained regularly this build up can catch fire.



ASH DISPOSAL

Fireplace ash holds heat for up to 5 days and can spark new fires. Always soak it with water in a metal bucket before binning it.

1ST RESPONDER VEHICLE PROJECT.

The funding for our new ute and building has had a significant boost recently. Port Otago has made a very generous donation, and we now have two thirds of the funding. They have also given us valuable guidance around the management of the whole project. I personally would like to thank Kevin Winters, Jodi Taylor and the Board of Port Otago Ltd. We are currently getting plans finalised, building consents and updating our quotes.

BRIGADE GOLD STAR AND SERVICE HONOURS NIGHT

The Portobello brigade recently held a function to celebrate 25 years' service for three of our members, Bronwyn Anderson, Bill Dickson and Dean Miekle. This is a special occasion for these long serving people who have given a lot to our community. They each received a gold star medal,

which are not that common, with Bronwyn being only the 17th female firefighter in New Zealand to complete 25 years' service. The rest of the brigade received honours to reflect service given. A total of 364 years' service amongst 20 members was recognized.

With the colder weather it has been great to have the two heat pumps going to make the Museum more cosy and welcoming for people as they look at the exhibits inside the main building.



- *The Sandymount dairy herd is known to be one of the best in Otago. The whole of the stock will be sold to the highest bidder.*

CONCERT AT PORTOBELLO.

The Portobello School Committee, in conjunction with the Broad Bay School Committee, gave an entertainment in the Coronation Hall at Portobello on Wednesday last for the purpose of raising money for the improvement of the school grounds. The hall was crowded to the door and a very appreciative audience enjoyed one of the brightest concerts ever held at Portobello. After the overture Mr Ernest Syrett soon had the audience in laughter in his rendering of humorous songs. Mr Alex. Burt gave the violin solo "Largo" and Mr Hugh Speight recited "The Irish Fire Brigade." After a song by Miss Q. Hanning the violin duet "Murray Moon" was rendered by Messrs A. Burt and D. Munro. Miss Marjorie Burt sang "The Request." Two youthful performers, Miss L. Pickard, in a recitation, and Miss E. Eddie, in a pianoforte solo, pleased the audience. Mr D. Munro sang "Cargoes" and a song by Mr Roberts concluded the concert items of the programme. The Broad Bay entertainers then staged the farce "Jane," and, although they met with stage difficulties, their efforts proved very successful.

Kia ora anō! Gosh it seems like a long time since our last newsletter. Thanks to Michael and his team. And that includes those of you who distribute them. Ngā mihi mana nui ki a koutou katoa! I had the privilege to chat to Paddy Gower, who has his own Podcast, and we had a brief catchup. He and his assistant were young when I was on TV hosting AFTER SCHOOL and they both used to come home and watch my show. “We were fans and we’re so privileged to have you on our Podcast.” Since then I researched Podcasting ‘cos I thought it was when you appear on someone’s internet video, like on You Tube. I wondered why Paddy wanted to chat with me and he made it obvious that he has a major theme for his Podcasting – Positivity & Inspiration – hats off to him and his team for producing that sort of show because a lot of material on TV – about 90% I reckon, is absolutely negative involving solving problems with guns and killing. I keep a journal with me in which I list things I really appreciate and it always fills me with positive feelings which I hope vibrates around me wherever I go. I love being with people who love what they do & where they are. Tony & Sarah are good examples. The food, drinks & atmosphere at the midwinter XMAS gig was just so positively fabulous. We even sang specially written carols. One of the many wonderful surprises in this piece of paradise!

Our very first mission back in 2020 was a long trek up Greenacres Track with Moira Parker, Fran Hammond and Marcia Dale to learn what banana passionfruit was and how to control it. From that modest start, we're grateful to be presently partly funded by the ORC (via ECO Fund and site-led funding) for specific Darwins Barberry projects while we continue our main push - which is working most Friday mornings (mostly unfunded) on eradicating pest plants from native bush remnants and properties across the Peninsula. life on the Peninsula (but not necessarily a botanist) and have a, "let's give it a go" attitude, then we'd like to invite you to come out with us one Friday morning to see what we do.

Quarantine Island/Kamau Taurua Community Inc.

Kia ora koutou,

Over the past few months, Island Keeper, Jon Clark, has had a very quiet time hosting a small number of groups of local families and friends enjoying some 'Island time' and choosing to stay a night or two in St Martin Lodge. Students from Macandrew Bay School held an overnight camp and students from St Peter's College and St Kevin's College stayed whilst attending the NZ Marine Studies Centre education programme. We hosted a large group of students from Otago Pacific Island Law Students' Association who held their third annual overnight camp. Students for Environmental Action - SEA Ōtepoti, members of the Otago Student Volunteer Army and Otago Birding Society also held an overnight camp and keenly volunteered during their stays.

Notable day visitors included Ranken ilor Arnott, a descendent of Mary Wright and her stillborn baby, both being recorded as being buried in the Island cemetery. Baby (Ebenezer) Wright was stillborn on 5th October 1879 and Mrs Mary Wright 37 years died during childbirth on 7th October 1879 on the ship Forfarshire. Ric and Scott Wilson, grandsons of Neville Fenton who leased the Island from 1943-1957, also unexpectedly visited. Neville used to run a ferry service from the Island to Port Chalmers, Portobello and the city, and at one time he was using the Elsie Evans. The suites in the Lodge were named after boats the Kiwi and the Warewa, and dinghy Huhu which Neville owned, and the signs on the doors were painted by their mother, Patricia. The Married Quarters building was once a chicken coop, which Neville claimed to be the largest in the southern hemisphere, the eggs would be used in Fenton's famous cake shop in George Street.

Our regular weekend mahi volunteer days and monthly Welcome Days have been enjoyed by new visitors and regular volunteers/Community members. Autumn and Winter is time for Community members and volunteers to plant seedlings, and this year we have been collecting seedlings from the bush track and potting them up in our shade house plant nursery too. Mahi has also included caring for native seedlings, weed control, maintaining and monitoring predator traps and tracking tunnels, completing the final autumn bird counts, building



maintenance and the completion of the second phase of re-aligning the cemetery fence.

Thanks to all our volunteers and Community members for their efforts on and off the island over the last few months. It has been a difficult time financially for the Community, with many grant applications being declined. However, we are extremely grateful to the Dunedin Heritage Fund who granted us \$15,000 towards a new roof for the Lodge.

With deep sadness we mourned the loss of Peter Matheson who died on 14th April aged 86 years. Peter was a Past President of St Martin Island Community Inc. and son of one of the founders, Rev James Matheson. We hold Peter with a deep regard, a tōtara in the forest, with the collective vision of the Island Community living on in his memory.
